

Hiking, Camping and Shooting's Camping Checklist

(as of 20 March 2022)

Camping incorporates and builds on the gear from Hiking (so you might want to look at our Hiking gear checklist too). But, since Camping normally includes getting further from civilization, staying overnight and making meals outdoors, the level of gear required and contingency planning is significantly greater than for hiking.

For Camping you need to plan for the duration of the trip, distance you are planning to travel, type of campsite you are going to, variable weather, water consumption, food preparation, sanitation and emergencies. It is important to prioritize the gear that you take to balance the likely need for specific items versus the available capacity to carry the items and the weight of the items

You might not need to take every piece of gear that you own on every Camping trip - but it makes sense to have everything available in your home inventory so that it is there if you need it for a trip.

Here's the type of gear that we use and think you need for *Camping*:

1) Shelter

- a. Tent with Ground Cloth and Inside Floor Cloth

- b. Tent for Additional People or Gear (if required)
- c. Small Tarp

- s. Folding Shovel with Case

- v. Survival Fishing Kit
- w. Fishing Line
- x. Survival Fishing Net
- y. Small Animal Snare Kit
- z. Braided Steel Wire
- aa. Camping Shower/Water Pump
- bb. Flexible Plastic Tubing
- cc. Tubing Clamps
- dd. Hockey Stick Tape for Wrapping Tool Handles
